### *Vestry Announces Parish Conversation*

### First Event, Sunday, June 27 at 10:00 a.m.

We have a wonderful challenge. On many Sundays, we are full at one or at both services at 8:45 and 11:00. Beginning late last summer your Vestry began to look at our services and attendance and to get a picture of our current situation.

Here are some numbers: St. Paul's can fit six people per pew, but people say it feels pretty crowded. Five per pew is full and comfortable. At six-per-pew our nave holds 237; at five-per-pew, we hold 197.

Every once in a while, we have nearly 230 in our nave at our 8:45 or 11:00 service. (Even more on Easter and Christmas.) It's very common for us to have around 197.

Our chancel, where the choir sits, is too small for our adult choir right now, and the space is often completely full with our children's choir as well.

Our Sunday worship space is just about at its limits.

Now is the time to talk and to plan. How can St. Paul's continue to be a vital and alive congregation? How should we plan for projected growth? ...through 2015, 2025, and beyond?

Please plan to participate in our upcoming parish conversations. We'll be asking important questions. One choice is to stay as we are and live as creatively as we can within our limited worship space. Other choices might emerge about how best to welcome and incorporate new members.

Please join us for our first parish conversation on this topic Sunday, June 27 at 10:00 a.m. during the Christian Formation hour in the Parish Hall. We hope you will be there.

Let me say that again: ... *a grand total of two thousand, one hundred and eight hours of volunteer time that was spent to make a difference in the lives of 22 children in our community.*
