St. Paul's Episcopal Church is committed to creating a safe environment that protects the well-being of all children and youth who participate in activities at our parish. We have designed and implemented policies to reflect that commitment.

Our staff and regular volunteers have all taken the Safeguarding God's Children training, a sexual abuse awareness and prevention program mandated by the Episcopal Church. Additionally, each volunteer has agreed to serve in accordance with our policy for ministries with children and youth. Please ask to see a copy of the policy if you would like more information.

Our staff members have all undergone background checks, anyone who provides transportation has a valid state driver's licenses and insurance on file in our office, and staff working directly with children and youth have been CPR, First Aid, and AED certified.

YOUTH FORMATION PROGRAMS

Building upon the foundations laid in our Children's Ministry programs, we strive to offer the youth of our parish (7th-12th graders) an inclusive space where they can begin to explore and articulate their own faith journey as well as build Christian community with their peers. We gather weekly on Sunday mornings, afternoons, and Wednesday evenings. We offer regular opportunities for service and gathering with other youth across the Diocese. Youth are welcome and encouraged to participate in all offerings.

Episcopal Youth Community (EYC)

Our EYC programming provides the space for youth in 7th through 12th grade to build relationships with their church peers, create mentorship relationships with adult volunteers, and explore their faith and self-identity in a community environment.

Sunday EYC 3:00 – 4:30 p.m.

On Sunday afternoons, we engage in activities based on one of our Youth Ministry values: Growth, Service, Inclusion & Community. We split into Junior High (7th & 8th grade) and Senior High (9th -12th grade) groups when appropriate and meaningful to do so. We utilize curriculum that supports our core competencies of "Lived Theology", "Service" and "Relationship Building" along with field trips and special outings.

Wednesday EYC

6:30 - 7:30 p.m.

On Wednesday evenings, following the 6:00 p.m. Eucharist service, youth gather from for an hour of discussion, games, and activities. We explore topics facing young people today, focusing on wholeness and wellness, while addressing the core competencies of "Biblical Literacy", "Worship & Spirituality", and "Relationship Building." This program helps youth navigate being a teenager through the lens of their faith and guides them through making choices that help them live into God's call for their lives.



Youth Sunday School

Sunday mornings, 10:00 – 10:50 a.m.

During the Sunday morning Formation Hour, youth engage in discussion to deepen our understanding of scripture. By focusing on "Biblical Literacy", "Worship & Spirituality", and "Lived Theology", youth contextualize the readings heard in church that morning. We discuss how scripture is speaking in our lives today and pray collectively for the week to come.

Sunday Suppers

Second Sunday of the month, 3:00 – 4:30 p.m.

Youth prepare and serve a meal for community members who are food insecure through our Sunday Suppers ministry of Trinity United Methodist Church (1021 W. Sycamore). Youth engage in direct service by preparing food, setting up the distribution line, serving food, and washing dishes. This program is in lieu of EYC every second Sunday. These are additional volunteer opportunities for families to help cook and transport meals components on Sunday Suppers weekends.

Confirmation

Sunday evenings, 5:30 – 6:30 p.m.

During the Spring semester, we offer Confirmation classes for youth in 10th - 12th grade. Confirmation is the sacramental rite in which the candidates who were baptized at an early age are expected to make a mature public affirmation of their faith, recommit themselves to the responsibilities of their baptism, and receive laying on of hands by a bishop. Using "My Faith, My Life" as our foundational text, Confirmation class invites youth to explore the beliefs of the Episcopal Church and identify their own beliefs in that context. We typically begin with an overnight retreat followed by a series of meetings on Sunday evenings in the weeks leading up to the Bishop's visit.

Pastoral Care

We are here to be a supportive community to one another, especially in times of need. Outside of large group gatherings, the Youth Minister is available for pastoral conversation with youth and their families as needed. If you would like to schedule a time outside of regular programming to check-in, catch up, or talk through an issue, reach out to Emma Mitchell via email or text. All pastoral meetings will be kept confidential (according to safeguarding guidelines) and held in a public setting suitable for discreet conversation. Parents/Caregivers may take part in arranging meeting and, when between a youth and Youth Minister, are informed about the time and place a meeting will be held.



St. Dominic Youth Choir

Our children and youth choirs rehearse weekly throughout the school year and provide music for Sunday worship during our 8:45 a.m. service and other special events. By participating, youth learn more about the traditions and beliefs of the church and engage in the larger music ministry of the church.

Our choirs offer their music as a gift to God. Rehearsals are fun and challenging. The choir utilizes the Royal School of Church Music, an acclaimed structured choral training that provides a framework for choral singers to develop their vocal skills, musical understanding, and knowledge of the repertoire. Ribbon training, according to the Royal School of Church Music training scheme, covers music theory, history, sight reading, liturgy, mentorship, and Christian formation. As they progress through the training, children and youth earn colored ribbons for their cross necklaces, which are worn with their choir robes. Faithful attendance and commitment to choir are recognized at our end of the school year. By participating in choir, our youth are exposed to service through ministry in the church

Choir Club

Wednesday afternoons, 3:30 – 5:15 p.m.

On Wednesdays afternoons, we provide supervised activities after school until dinner at 5:15 p.m. The Wednesday afternoon schedule is as follows:

3:30-4:15 p.m. Drop-off on Playground **4:15 – 5:15 p.m.** Youth Choir Rehearsal

5:15 p.m. Dinner **6:00 p.m.** Holy Eucharist (Parish Hall) **6:30 – 7:30 p.m.** EYC (Youth Center)

Participation in Worship

At St. Paul's, youth are welcome and invited to participate roles during worship in addition to singing in the choir. Let us know if you are interested in serving in a liturgical role; these include being an Acolyte or an Usher, serving with the Altar or Bread Guild, or (once Confirmed) serving as a Lay Reader/Eucharistic Minister. These roles require training once we have mutually discerned what you feel capable of and called to do.

POLICIES & PROCEDURES

The following are participation expectations for our Youth Ministry programs.

Age Specifications

Our Youth Ministry program welcomes youth who are entering 7th grade through graduating seniors to participate.

- Youth who attend traditional school and turn 18 during their senior year may continue to participate until their graduation date.
- Youth who attend non-traditional school (i.e. virtual or home school) may participate through the end of the academic year during which they turned 18.

Participation Expectations

- All youth must have registration and release forms on file to participate.
- During program times, the Youth Minister and volunteers are responsible for the safety of youth. As such, youth are expected to be physically present with the whole the group for the duration of the program, including mealtimes and worship.
 - o If a youth's caregiver is present during any portion of the program time, such as dinner or worship, they become responsible for the safety of their child. The youth may arrange an exception to the above stated rule by communicating with both the caregiver and the Youth Minister.
- When on campus, we have confidence in youth to take care of their own physical needs such as using the restroom and getting food or beverages without asking permission.
 When off campus youth should communicate with an adult leader when they take leave to address their physical needs.
- We also trust youth to take care of their emotional needs If youth need a short break
 from participation, they may communicate this to an adult leader. When taking space
 youth should remain in sight of the adult leader or in an adjacent room to the large
 group.
- If homework or another commitment is interfering with being fully present for a
 program youth may speak to an adult about how to address the issue. Part of being in a
 youth community is giving your energy and presence to those around you, and this isn't
 possible if you're working on other projects, staying on your phone, or isolating from
 the large group.



Cellphone and Electronic Device Use

Youth should keep all electronic devices put away out of sight. If they become a distraction youth may be asked to place their device in a designated storage area while participating in programs. Exceptions to this rule include designated unprogrammed time, to communicate with caregivers about transportation, or in case of emergency.

Transportation Policies

When dropping off or picking up youth from a youth event...

- Drop-off/pick up youth within sight of the Youth Center door. If we are meeting elsewhere, please make sure your child gets to the right location before leaving.
- Let the Youth Director/supervising adult know who will be dropping off/picking up youth if it is someone different than a parent/guardian.
- If dropping off youth early, stay with them until two supervisory adults are present.
- If you are running late to pick your youth up, please text/call the Youth Director to let them know your estimated arrival time.

If your child/children walk to/from St. Paul's...

- Please text/call the Youth Director to let them know your youth has permission to walk home or to another location after the youth event.
- If it is dark or the weather prohibits walking home, it will be assumed that a parent/guardian is coming to pick up your child/children and they should stay at the Youth Center under supervision until you arrive.

If you are a youth who drives themselves/other youth to St. Paul's...

- If you are at St. Paul's during a youth meeting you are expected to be in attendance of said meeting.
- If you choose to leave, it is your responsibility to inform your parent/guardian that you have left St. Paul's.
